

OPHTHALMOLOGY

Dr. Mary Glaze, DVM, MS, DACVO October 18, 2017

Mary Belle Glaze is a 1976 graduate of Texas A&M University's College of Veterinary Medicine. After 2 years in small animal general practice in Baton Rouge, Louisiana, she returned to academia, completing a residency and Master's degree in veterinary ophthalmology at Michigan State University in 1981. She spent the next 20 years on faculty at Louisiana State University's Veterinary Teaching Hospital, retiring as Professor Emeritus in 2001. That same year she joined the Gulf Coast Animal Eye Clinic in Houston Texas, where she is one of three ophthalmologists on staff.

Dr. Glaze has been a diplomate of the American College of Veterinary Ophthalmologists (ACVO) since 1981 and has served as secretarytreasurer, regent, and president. She was the first woman elected president of the American Society of Veterinary Ophthalmology (ASVO). She has spoken to veterinary groups throughout the world, has authored a variety of journal articles and book chapters, and is the co-author (with Kerry Ketring) of veterinary atlases on feline ocular disease and canine inherited ocular disorders. She is an online consultant for VIN (Veterinary Information Network) and is an adjunct clinical professor at Texas A&M University and Lincoln Memorial University. For fun, she races Corvettes. "If everything seems under control, you're just not going fast enough."

Some of the topics to be discussed include: Refractory Corneal Ulcers, Non-Ulcerative Corneal Disease, Canine and Feline Uveitis, Lids and Lashes, Buff and Turf: Acute Care for the Critical Eye and Ophthalmic Potpourri.

Dr. Michael P. Kowaleski, DVM Diplomate ACVS, ECVS

Dr. Kowaleski earned his DVM degree at the Tufts University School of Veterinary Medicine in 1993. After several years in general practice, he completed his residency training in small animal surgery at Tufts University in a joint program with the Angell Memorial Animal Hospital in 2002. He earned board certification by the American College of Veterinary Surgeons in 2003 and the European College of Veterinary Surgeons in 2010. He was an Assistant Professor of Small Animal Orthopedic Surgery at The Ohio State University from August 2002-August 2007 at which time he was promoted to Associate Professor with tenure. He returned to Tufts in 2007, and currently, he is a Professor of Small Animal Orthopedic Surgery at the Cummings School of Veterinary Medicine at Tufts University. His areas of clinical and research interest include arthroscopy, enhancement of fracture healing, external skeletal fixation, fracture repair and orthopedic implants, total joint replacement, clinical and radiological assessment of limb alignment, osteoarthritis, perioperative and chronic pain management, and the role of osteotomy in the management of joint disease.

Some of the topics that will be discussed include: Clinical examination of the stifle, what you need to know. Tips and tricks on stifle approach, meniscal evaluation and treatment. Early diagnosis of CrCL disease, what would you do if it was your dog? Small breed dog and cat CrCL disease. Elbow dysplasia, new treatment options. Clinical examination of the hip. Surgical management of juvenile hip dysplasia, a case based approach. Joint disasters- how to avoid.
