MINIMALLY INVASIVE ORTHOPEDIC SURGERY

Following diagnosis of the orthopedic injury, it is up to the surgeon to recommend procedure options. An alternative to a traditional open arthrotomy, a much more invasive approach, is arthroscopy. Minimally invasive techniques have been the standard of care for human surgery for many years. Arthroscopy is now becoming much more widely used and accepted in veterinary medicine, as it allows for a minimally invasive approach to the joint, visualizing intra-articular structures like the cranial and caudal cruciate ligaments, cartilage, and menisci. It is both diagnostic and therapeutic; by greatly magnifying and illuminating the articular structures, it allows for improved diagnosis of pathology, while simultaneously treating the condition. Joints that can be explored arthroscopically include the stifle, shoulder, and elbow; the tarsus and hip can also be explored arthroscopically in select patients.

Joint surface evaluation: Arthroscopy remains the gold standard for evaluation of cartilage pathology. Osteochondritis and osteochondrosis dessicans lesions can be evaluated, documented, and probed via minimally invasive ports. Additionally, these lesions are more readily visible with arthroscopy.

Cartilage resurfacing techniques, such as the Osteochondral Autograft Transfer System (OATS®) and synthetic allograft system (SynACART®) can be performed in severe cases of cartilage damage or OCD. Arthroscopy is also a primary step in treating end-stage elbow disease; it is performed immediately prior to and selecting candidates for performing the Canine Unicompartmental Elbow (CUE) technique.

Intra-articular pathology: Intra-articular ligamentous structures are readily viewed and magnified with arthroscopy. This gives us great detail in diagnosing and treating cranial cruciate ligament injury, meniscal injury, long digital extensor tendinopathy, biceps tendon evaluation, and even collateral ligament evaluation. Subtle changes in the ligaments or tendons are visible arthroscopically, whereas they would not be visible using an arthrotomy.

Changes to the ligaments or tendons can be treated arthroscopically as well, through procedures like tendon release or transposition, biopsy, or even repair as in the case of shoulder or hip luxation. In these cases, arthroscopy aids in both the diagnosis and placement of implants while only performing a minimal approach to the joint to reduce patient morbidity.

Specific joints: Arthroscopy of the stifle has been shown to have increased rates of meniscal tear diagnosis compared with arthrotomy in dogs with cranial cruciate ligament (CCL) disease. Concurrent meniscal tears were diagnosed in 83% of stifles explored arthroscopically, vs. 44% assessed by arthrotomy. Probing during arthroscopy increases the meniscal diagnosis rate by 8 times. Meniscal tears can be treated arthroscopically via debridement and excision. Meniscal release can be performed using radiofrequency ablation technology. Late meniscal injury, which occurs approximately 5.4-12% of the time, can also be diagnosed and treated arthroscopically after a TPLO or other procedure has been performed.

Arthroscopy of the shoulder allows a minimally invasive way to evaluate the biceps tendon and possible OCD lesions. Both a biceps release and cartilage debridement can be performed arthroscopically, allowing for 2-3 incisions of only a few millimeters into the joint. This technique has improved accessibility and visualization of the caudal humeral head, where OCD lesions are typically located. Additionally, arthroscopy has been used to assist in shoulder instability repair.

Similar to the shoulder, elbow arthroscopy provides a minimally invasive way to evaluate the cartilage and bone structures of the elbow. Fragmented medial coronoid processes, ununited anconeal processes, and OCD lesions can be debrided and treated with this approach, preventing a large arthrotomy and allowing improved access and visualization of otherwise small structures. Even in cases of more severe progression of osteoarthritis and erosion of the medial compartment, arthroscopy can aid in both diagnosis and treatment. Additionally, biceps release can be performed at the elbow, if indicated.

Tarsal/coxofemoral arthroscopy can be used to evaluate for OCD lesions, as well as aiding in a minimally invasive reduction of coxofemoral luxation and Toggle pinning in select patients.

Dr. Retallack has gained considerable experience in minimally invasive orthopedic surgery during her residency and additional off-site courses.

A common owner is a person or entity which owns 5% or more of an entity or practice. Shareholders or sole proprietors of an entity or practice shall be considered an owner along with the entity that holds an interest in the business or practice.

Corporate ¼ page ads are limited to one business, owner or corporation for each issue of the SEMVMA newsletter. This is in the interest of having the newsletter inform the association and not overwhelm them with ads. The SEMVMA council may modify or waive the application of this policy on a case by case basis at the discretion of the council.

Ads will run only once unless a request is submitted to the Administrative Secretary to run longer. Classified ads are \$15 for 60 words or less and \$25 for 61–100 words. Corporate ¼ page ads are \$135 per issue or \$500 for four issues. Payment is due at the time of the initial ad placement.

SEMVMA Members interested in providing Relief Veterinary Services can advertise in the newsletter at no charge. The classified ads must follow the same guidelines regarding number of words and deadline restrictions as all other classified ads. Newsletters are published quarterly: on March 15th, June 15th, September 15th and December 15th. All ads should be submitted to the SEMVMA office by the 15th of the month preceding publication.
