VACCINES & IMMUNIZATIONS

Dr. Richard Ford

Sponsor – Boehringer Ingelheim

October 28, 2020

Dr. Richard Ford is Emeritus Professor of Medicine in the College of Veterinary Medicine at North Carolina State University. A graduate of Ohio State University, Dr. Ford practiced small animal and equine medicine prior to completing the internal medicine residency at Michigan State University. He is Board Certified by the American College of Veterinary Internal Medicine and is an honorary Diplomate in the American College of Veterinary Preventive Medicine. Dr. Ford is the Lead Editor of the AAHA Canine Vaccine Guidelines and a co-author on the AAFP Feline Vaccine Guidelines. Outside of veterinary medicine, he retired from the USAF Reserve as a Brigadier General, where he was assigned to the Office of the Air Force Surgeon General at the Pentagon.

Some of the topics that Dr. Ford will discuss include: VACCINES & VACCINATION: Protocols, Products, and Controversies. This vaccine presentation addresses the most current information available on companion animal vaccine use and selection. VACCINE-ADVERSE REACTIONS and INJURY: Vaccine adverse events (adverse reactions) among dogs and cats have only recently become the target of (limited) scientific study. It is the purpose of this presentation to increase awareness of the types and

frequency of reactions seen, and to address recommendations for mitigating known (or suspected) reactions. RABIES AWARENESS CHALLENGE: This is an interactive presentation designed to challenge participating veterinarians on the appropriate actions when dealing with legal and regulatory issues pertaining to rabies immunization in companion animals in the State of Michigan. Utilizing case scenarios, the audience will be challenged to provide the correct responses/actions required under a variety of circumstances encountered in practice. ANTIBODY TESTING v. VACCINATION: Applications in Practice. The utilization of “Vaccine Titrers” continues to emerge in companion animal practice. This presentation addresses the 3 most fundamental issues facing veterinarians regarding application of antibody testing in practice. TICK-BORNE DISEASES: Ehrlichiosis & Lyme Borreliosis & Anaplasmosis: This presentation centers on the diagnosis, management, and prevention of the most common tick-borne diseases recognized in dogs. With the 4Dx...and now the 4Dx Plus SNAP Test...available to veterinarians, emphasis is placed on the use and interpretation of the “Blue Dot”. Treatment modalities and treatment failures (probably much more prevalent than we realized) will be addressed.

INTERNAL MEDICINE WITH ROUNDS

Michael Schaer, DVM, Diplomate ACVIM, Diplomate ACVECC

Dr. Michael Schaer received his DVM degree from the University of Illinois in 1970. He then went to the Animal Medical Center in New York City where he served as an intern and then as a medicine resident between 1970-73. After the residency, he remained at the AMC as a staff member in the Department of Medicine until 1977. He then joined a private small animal practice in New Jersey until late 1978 at which time he joined the faculty at the University of Florida, College of Veterinary Medicine where he has remained until the present time. Dr. Schaer is also the author of five textbooks: Clinical Medicine of the Dog and Cat – 1st, 2nd, and 3rd editions and Clinical Signs in Small Animal Medicine, 1st and 2nd editions. At the U of F, Dr. Schaer functions mainly as a clinician and a teacher. He is currently Professor Emeritus and Adjunct Professor in Emergency and Critical Care Medicine, while still doing active teaching in the classroom and in the critical care unit.

Some of the topics Dr. Schaer will discuss include: Emergency Medicine Rounds. This presentation will show cases that will illustrate the clinical features for rapid diagnosis and the therapeutic principles regarding each case. All the material will be very practical. Iatrogenic Complications in the ICU and ER. This seminar will present real case mishaps that might have been avoided if all of the clinical features were taken into considerations. These cases will illustrate that hindsight should be continuously applied during problem solving, and that many problems are avoidable, but allowing for some disasters that will occur regardless. Pictures worth 1000 words. This presentation is a lay back image presentation showing very interesting lesions, images, etc that will allow for many take-home messages. It is all images and very easy to digest. Clinical Pearls. This seminar is a collection of valuable lessons learned over my many years of clinical experience.

PHYSICAL THERAPY & REHABILITATION

Dr. Kristin Kirkby

Dr. Kristin Kirkby Shaw is a small animal surgeon and rehabilitation specialist whose career has focused on bridging the gap between these two disciplines, with specific emphasis on treatment of arthritis. Kristin received her DVM from the University of Florida in 2003. She also completed a small animal surgery residency, MS and PhD at the University of Florida. She became a Diplomate of the American College of Veterinary Surgery in

2009 and Diplomate of the American College of Veterinary Sports Medicine and Rehabilitation in 2013. Kristin is a managing partner and surgeon at Animal Surgical and Orthopedic Center in Seattle and Medical Director of the rehabilitation department, SOUND Veterinary Rehabilitation Center. Kristin founded CARE in 2019 to provide evidence-based resources and tools for those caring for dogs with arthritis.

Some of the topics that Dr. Kirkby will discuss include: The not so magic 8 ball: Predicting OA through early detection of developmental orthopedic diseases. Canine osteoarthritis is almost always a secondary disease due to developmental orthopedic diseases, such as hip and elbow dysplasia. Tips and Tricks for the Orthopedic Exam: A comprehensive orthopedic exam includes obtaining a thorough history, observing movement and transitions, and palpation. This session will provide tips for incorporating an orthopedic screening exam into a general physical

exam as well as conducting a thorough orthopedic exam when indicated. The Comprehensive Care Quad for OA management: “Multi-modal management of pain” has grown up and has a new name: Comprehensive Care. Within each quad are numerous treatment techniques that can be selected based on the individual patient and client’s needs. Measuring Success: This presentation will discuss when to expect to see improvement following various treatments, how frequent patients with OA should be rechecked, and how to implement client specific outcome measures into practice.

DERMATOLOGY

Dr. Douglas DeBoer

Dr. DeBoer is a graduate of the School of Veterinary Medicine, University of California-Davis, and completed postgraduate training at Michigan State University and at UC Davis. In 1986, he joined the faculty of the School of Veterinary Medicine, University of Wisconsin-Madison, where he is currently Professor of Dermatology. His research and clinical interests center on the immunology of recurrent and chronic skin diseases, with a focus on canine allergic skin disease. He is a diplomate of the American College of Veterinary Dermatology and has served on the scientific editorial boards of the American Journal of Veterinary

Research and Veterinary Dermatology, and is former chair of the International Committee on Allergic Diseases of Animals. Dr. DeBoer is the author of more than 200 clinical and research publications in veterinary dermatology.

Some of the topics Dr. DeBoer will discuss include: New Drugs on the Block – Dermatology Edition. Adverse Cutaneous Drug Reactions: Will You Recognize Them? Feline Otitis – Cats are Not Small Dogs. Food and the Skin: What Do We Really Know? Cytopoint, Apoquel, Atopica – How Do I Choose? Pododermatitis and Claw Diseases.

OPHTHALMOLOGY

Dr. David Williams

Dr. David Williams qualified from Cambridge in 1988, aiming to devote his professional life to veterinary ophthalmology. Having worked at the Animal Health Trust and Royal Veterinary College where he gained his CertVOphthal and a PhD researching in ocular immunology, he then returned to Cambridge, studied for his FRCVS with a dissertation of ocular abnormalities in farmed halibut as part of his continuing interest in exotic animal medicine and a VetMD concentrating on age-related cataracts across the species. He now teaches ophthalmology there running the ophthalmology clinic. His is a diplomate of the European College of Animal Welfare and Behaviour Medicine, has a Master’s in Education and is

currently undertaking a Doctorate in that subject, focusing on the teaching of veterinary ethics and animal welfare. He has always had a great interest in continuing education and provides cpd lectures in ophthalmology and animal welfare nationally and internationally.
